CBYCA REPORT Tom Powers

The LNG problem is still on the burner. It is an uphill fight that our CBYCA Directors of State Legislators are keeping on top of with the help of all our members. If you hear of any meetings on the subject get in touch with me, and I will get the information to the right person. It would be a great idea if you would attend these meetings also. These LNG ships will have to be escorted all the way up the Bay by the Coast Guard with boats and aircraft and any other law enforcement agency available. If you happen to be on the Bay as one of these ships are coming up, you will have to stay one to two miles away from it. That has to tell you something about that ship and its cargo.

I mentioned at the raft-up meeting on about the VX nerve gas that the US Army wants to send to the DuPont Chemical Company to dilute and expose of in the Delaware River. So far New Jersey has not given permission to ship it. It is uncertain what damage it will do to the Delaware River and the surrounding area.

Fall Cruise to the Choptank by Steve Hornberger

The crew of *Sun Runner* left Parkside Marina at 1100 hours on Saturday, September 23rd enroute to the Magothy River to meet up with whomever was going on the Choptank River Cruise. At the bottom of Frog Mortar Creek we raised the sails in the 10 - 15 knot breeze and turned east toward the Bay on a beam reach. After an hour or so of excellent sailing, we turned south before the wind started to die off leaving us to motor sail for the remainder of the trip to the Magothy.

On the Magothy, at the "Horse Farm," the crews of *Dolphin* and *Champagne* rafted with us. *Tomorrow Came* arrived just before dusk and anchored nearby, while *Zepherus III* arrived sometime later and anchored near Dobbins Island. The traditional evening gathering took place aboard *Sun Runner*.

Sunday was a beautiful day of sun, warm temperatures



and little wind. After a leisurely morning of coffee, and chit chat, Dolphin was off to visit various places on the Magothy before heading Baltimore;

Champagne was heading out for a day sail before returning to their home port; and Sun Runner along with Zepherus III headed for a long motor, riding a favorable current to Dun Cove. Sun Runner and Mozella chatted on the radio as their fleet headed north to home ports.

Monday, with weather checked and little breeze, so we thought, *Sun Runner* and *Zepherus III* headed for Trippe Creek. As things al-



ways do, the wind came up as we exited Dun Cove. In response, we were forced to enjoy a nice six knot sail up the Choptank in 10 to 15 knot winds. At the end of our journey, we anchored in Flatty Cove just outside Goldsborough Creek on the Tred Avon River and enjoyed a nice breeze through the boats and fantastic scenery 'til the next morning.

Tuesday took us to Cambridge for two days to enjoy the town's scenery, eateries, shops, and so forth. Again we enjoyed 10 to 15 knot winds from the southwest, which took us under sail from Oxford to R24 just outside of the Cambridge Municipal Marina. Mother Nature did her thing on Wednesday with typical NW winds following the cold front that passed over the night before producing the usual small craft advisories.

As a special note, Cambridge is a rapidly changing destination for cruisers. They are expanding and modernizing their municipal marina to support a growing trend of

tables, LP grills, and the short walk to town to take in its many places of interest. The 2007 season will see the completion of the marina facilities that will include a new fuel dock. With the addition of 150 new slips, Cambridge could easily be an excellent destination for an NSHSA cruise or even a Hunter Rendezvous.

At 1030 hours on Thursday, we departed Cambridge enroute to the Rhode River. Early morning brisk winds gave way to no wind at all by the time we reached the Tred Avon River. So, it was the iron genny that took us west and north on a superbly sunny and cool day. With flat water we motored through Knapps Narrows and went behind Poplar Island before crossing the bay to the Rhode. Knapps Narrows is open and accessible at both ends. We saw no less than seven and a half feet throughout at low tide.

Friday brought us a rather interesting weather report for the next several days. We decided to head for points
